SNIPPETS

A new hotel in the Philippines has won the Guinness World Record for the largest building in the shape of a chicken, says The Architect's Newspaper. The 114-foot rooster at the Campuestohan Highland Resort was dreamt up by owner Ricardo Tan, who said he wanted to build something with "wow factor". The colossal cock pays homage both to the local agricultural sector and the country's controversial cockfighting industry. It has 15 rooms at around \$100 a night, although they don't have windows in order to maintain the rooster's "aesthetic integrity".

Britain has long been a pioneer in telecoms: we built the first commercial telegraph in 1837; made the first transatlantic phone call 90 years later; and sent the first text message to a mobile phone in 1992. But today the industry "lags rather than leads", says The Economist. According to new research, Britain ranks 46th for mobile network download speeds out of the 56 developed and developing countries for which data exists – "the worst mobile service in the rich world".

Days before signing the US Constitution in 1787, George Washington and his pals racked up a bar tab at Philadelphia's City Tavern worth the equivalent of \$15,600 today, says Gastro Obscura.
