TRIP TO OLIVER CROMWELL'S HOUSE AND ELY CATHEDRAL

EXCITING 2026 OUTING

Join us for a fascinating day out on February 12th 2026 exploring the history and heritage of Ely!

Oliver Cromwell's House. The House was the family home of Oliver Cromwell, who lived there with his wife and children from around 1636 to 1647. The house offers a unique insight into how a middle-class family lived in the 17th century. Exhibits also chart Cromwell's remarkable rise from local gentleman to military leader, and eventually Lord Protector.

The tour of the house will be divided into two groups and will take approximately 90 minutes. Please note that there is no lift, and access involves around 20 steps with a handrail. After the house tour, there will be time for lunch before we enjoy a guided tour of Ely Cathedral at 3:00 p.m. Ely Cathedral is one of the most magnificent medieval cathedrals in England, dominating the skyline for miles—hence Ely's nickname, "The Ship of the Fens." The cathedral has also featured in several major films and TV shows, including The King's Speech, The Golden Age, and The Crown, often standing in for Westminster Abbey.

The immersive Van Gogh exhibition in Commercial Road was not an easy building to find, despite its immense height, due to the lack of numbers on any of the shops, and we all walked past it at least once.

Although the exhibition had warned us it was not wheelchair accessible, it had not mentioned the 40 foot climb up a steel gangway to the first floor of the exhibition detailing Van Gogh's life and early death chronicled alongside his many paintings. However the highlight of the exhibition was the warehouse sized room, where many of his masterpieces were projected all around the walls, so you felt you were part of the actual painting as it seemed to come to life

Another room that provided an extra dimension to the experience was the drawing room. Although aimed at children, at least one of us created his own Van Gogh masterpiece from the colouring materials provided. Photos were taken by Elena Vorontsova and John Lawrence.
