TRIP TO OLIVER CROMWELL'S HOUSE AND ELY CATHEDRAL



Join us for a day out on February 12th 2026, exploring the history and heritage of Ely! There are 7 places left for the trip

Oliver Cromwell's House. The House was the family home of Oliver Cromwell, who lived there with his wife and children from around 1636 to 1647. The house offers a unique insight into how a middle-class family lived in the 17th century. Exhibits also chart Cromwell's remarkable rise from local gentleman to military leader and eventually Lord Protector.

The tour of the house will be divided into two groups and will take approximately 90 minutes. Please note that there is no lift, and access involves around 20 steps with a handrail. After the house tour, there will be time for lunch before we enjoy a guided tour of Ely Cathedral at 3:00pm. Ely Cathedral is one of the most magnificent medieval cathedrals in England, dominating the skyline for miles—hence Ely's nickname, "The Ship of the Fens." The cathedral has also featured in major films and TV shows, including The King's Speech, The Golden Age, and The Crown, often standing in for Westminster Abbey.



A group of U3A members recently spent a very enjoyable afternoon at County Hall watching an Agatha Christie mystery, Witness For The Prosecution. Spoiler alert for anyone planning to go and see this,

Witness for the Prosecution is one of Agatha Christie's most gripping courtroom dramas, originally written as a short story before Christie adapted it into a stage play. The plot centres on Leonard Vole, a seemingly ordinary young man

accused of murdering an elderly woman who had taken a particular interest in him. The evidence appears overwhelmingly against him—motive, opportunity, and suspicious behaviour—but Leonard pleads innocent. The tension escalates as the trial unfolds, with Christie carefully layering doubt and intrigue to keep the audience guessing.

What sets the play apart is the character of Romaine, Leonard's enigmatic wife, whose testimony becomes the dramatic crux of the story. Her motives are ambiguous, her allegiance uncertain, and her presence electrifies the courtroom scenes.

Christie masterfully blends psychological complexity with traditional mystery elements, creating a narrative that is both tightly structured and emotionally charged. The play's famous twist ending—still considered one of Christie's best—delivers a final shock that redefines everything the audience thought they knew, reaffirming her reputation as a master of surprise.

After a thoroughly enjoyable afternoon in the company of our U3A friends the journey home was good with the District and Central lines behaving themselves. Come and join us at the next outing.
